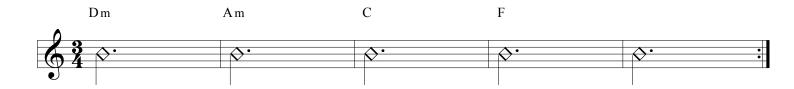
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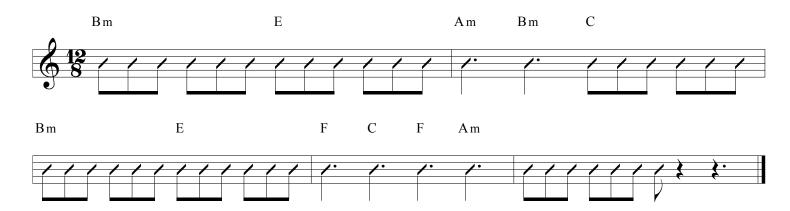
Rhythm 8: Alternative Time Signatures

Even if the 4/4 time signature is the most common, there are other interesting time signatures that we can use. The use of the time signatures will depend on the style but some songwriters like Sting use odd time signatures to experiment and surprise the listener.

Exercise 339: 3/4 is the time signature for waltzes but is also used in pop. Try this chord progression based on Billie Eilish's chorus at 'When the party is over'.



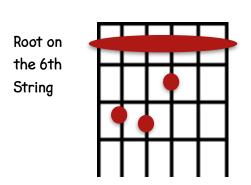

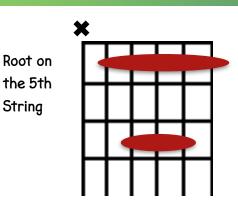


Exercise 341: 5/4 this is not very common but you can find it in Jazz. Check out the chords on 'Take Five' by Dave Brubeck.

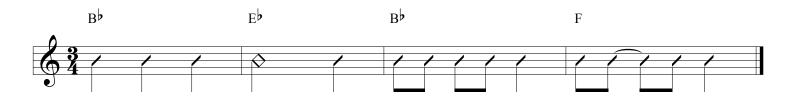

Congratulations! You have completed the Jam Now! Method for Beginners.
